After all the bad weather this winter a little bit of cheer is needed, so this month we are introducing a new tune. You will find it in Dropbox under Eagan's Polka. Eagan's is also known as Peg Ryan's. This is a peppy little piece as most polka's are, but it is also quite simple. Emphasis beat is on the first and third beat of the measure. The tune is repetitive. Once you learn the first line you will know most of the second. When you learn the third line you will know most of the fourth. Tempo is about 90bpm. Start slow and build it up. You will find that this piece works very well standing alone or as a bridge between two other pieces, such as Kesh Jig, and John Ryans Polka. It also lends itself to call and response. Take a few minutes to work on this and we will try it at the next meeting. Enjoy!



# Getting to Know You....Ann Wassell

Hello everyone, my name is Ann Wassell and I have been a member of Silver Strings for two years and play the hammered dulcimer. I was born in Bridgeport, West Virginia. My mother worked for the post office for over 30 years and my Dad for Equitable Gas in W.V. and I also have a younger sister. When I was little no one played an instrument except my dad's father who was a well-known fiddle player in West Virginia. He played at barn dances, weddings- any place he was asked to play. My younger sister still has his fiddle to this day, but sadly it hasn't been played since he died many years ago.

When I started school, it was in an old one room schoolhouse where one teacher taught every grade. When I entered the second grade I was the only one in that grade so my teacher promoted me to 3rd grade. At the age of nine I started taking

piano lessons and continued for the next eight years. I was pretty good at the piano and was asked to play a lot of events and gatherings.

I graduated from high school when I was 16 and then went on to attend West Virginia Wesleyan College where I majored in home economics and minored in English. Soon after, I met and married Willard and we started a family. Together we raised two great children, Tracy and TJ. When the kids started school I decided to go back to college and earned a master's degree in dietetics and then worked as a registered dietitian at Mt. Carmel/Grace Hospital in the kidney dialysis unit for 18 years.

Once the kids were grown and on their own, Willard and I became worldwide travelers. We toured Alaska, Hawaii, Europe, Asia, Australia and all over the U.S. I think my favorite destination was Thailand- I loved the culture, food, music, and scenery there. Sadly, I lost Willard to cancer two years ago after 54 years of marriage. Somehow through all this I met a wonderful lady named Pennye Scheiber who became my dulcimer teacher and mentor. As I progressed I formed a group called the Jammin' Grammas and Pennye joined us along with a guitar player. The group evolved over a period of 10 years. It was a great experience and we played all over the place, but the place that I remember the most was playing every Christmas at the Stranhan Mansion in Toledo, Ohio. I also joined the Uncle Carl's Club and was secretary for two terms and president for four years and am still a member there.

I now have five grown grandchildren that I enjoy along with teaching and having a beginning hammered dulcimer group meet at my house twice a month. I enjoy playing bridge, golfing, sewing, and quilting so I'm always busy doing something. Life continues opening up new windows for me every day and usually I am open to doing just that especially now that I have been plunged into the electronic world of smart phones, tablets, and digital music...wish me luck on those! If you ever have any questions about the hammered dulcimer or need tips on playing it better, or short cuts to use- just look me up at our meetings.
