#### MUSIC COORDINATOR NOTES...Marsha Kozlowski

One last look back at the holiday season music: Thank all of you who practiced, played and contributed your talent to make our performances so outstanding. The feedback was very positive, both in terms of selling our CDs and the compliments we received. We even inspired a few people to start learning to play the

dulcimer. How cool is that! From the first to the last, the audience enjoyed it.

"Bravo" – the frequent shout from a little boy after a tune he liked. "Your version of 'God Rest Ye' was so cool. It was like the Barenaked Ladies version. "Your encore was lovely." "Loved hearing the harmonicas and whistles." "Do you have a CD with your new tunes?" "You get better every year and really "fancied up" the tunes this time. Loved it." Really liked the "We Three Kings/Carol of the Bells" "My favorite was the Pachalbel." "Do you have a brochure - I want to take it to our Choir Director and maybe have you come to our church.""I wasn't going to come, but am so glad I did. You guys were great!" "We need to have you back." Good job, everyone!!!

Happy New Year - may it be filled with the joy of music, the blessings that come when we play together, and the hope and anticipation of new musical adventures to come. Here are my New Year's Resolutions for music coordination:

- Continue to add new tunes. The first one of 2017 is, "Lavender Blue." This is an old English tune dating back to the late 1600's. It had very bawdy lyrics until it was cleaned up to be a Song for the Nursery in the 1800s. It has been recorded a number of times, by Sammy Kaye and his orchestra, Burl Ives, Dinah Shore. Its latest incarnation is the version heard in the Disney movie, Cinderella. It has been played in  $\frac{3}{4}$  and  $\frac{4}{4}$  time. The version you will find in Dropbox is in <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> time. It is played ABA. You will note there is a  $3^{rd}$  ending that is only played if we play the tune 3 times. Try it out. Play it for your Grandchildren. Eventually it will be part of our Love Song playlist, i.e., February, or if we play for an anniversary party.
- Start up New Classics -at 6:00 on January 19. The tunes we will work on are 3 parts. The parts will be divided so that Mountain Dulcimers comprise one section. If you are an HD player who also plays MD, this is a good time to use your second instrument. If you did not play the classical pieces last year for whatever reason (too difficult, didn't have time), please give it another try. The pieces we are doing are easier to do and playing in parts is a good experience for all.
- Workshops add something to the club, whether it is to learn a new tune, a new technique, a different instrument. If you are able and willing to do a workshop on something, let me know. My hope is that there will be a harmonica workshop so that come next holiday season there are at least 6 players who can add something to a certain tune. Another suggestion is a workshop on how to use a tablet for music.
- Take our Library Outreach Program to 5-6 more libraries in the area by the end of 2017.. So far we have two more programs scheduled. I presented the concept at a Performance Showcase held by The Library Network. It was attended by representatives of approximately 25 libraries. So we will see. In talking to our holiday audience, several

people have expressed interested in coming to these. Please mark your calendars to be part of this. To be most effective, about 10 HD players are needed as well as 5-6 back-up players.

- Update the music packet this was done a year ago. When our newest member joined in November, we discovered we were down to one packet. So it is "housecleaning" time – to get everyone on the same page, LOL
- Find a **Slow Jam Leader** to run the slow jams which help those who are not quite up to speed with a focus on specific tunes – maybe those on the playlist, or the new tunes?
- Make our **Evart** performance fun and special so the audience will be entertained, that those playing get have a great experience and that it will be remembered and all will go home with a warm memory of music in Evart.
- ????? this resolution is to be open to serendipity, a new adventure, a fresh idea, experience, or who knows what. I leave it as a question to which the answer is coming.

NOTES ON THE CHOSEN TUNES:

**Buffalo Gals** – out strolling and looking to go to a dance to meet eligible men.

**South Wind** – blowing a kiss that is warm and caressing like a South Wind that fills the sails of the ship that is bring their sailors home

**Yellow Bird** – Haitian folk tune about a beautiful young lady whose nickname was Yellow Bird. The tune's words are of a young man who praises the beauty of a woman and would like to be her lover.

**Bei Meir Mist Du Schoen** – means "I find you pretty" Road to Lisdoonvarna – annual fair to find a beau – eHarmony prior to internet

**Star of the County Down** – story of a young man who by chance meets a lovely young woman, Rose. The infatuation grows and he imagines himself marrying the girl.

**Muss I Denn** – based on a German folk song. Asks the lover to "be good to me, be good to me, be to me how you really should."

**Katushka** – a tender nickname for Ekterina, a peasant girl who longs for her beloved who is serving far away on the border. Themes: loyal girl pining for her love, the heroic soldier and impending sense of war that may lose him to her forever.

**Red Wing** – Indian maid who loved a warrior but he rode away to battle and she is weeping her heart away.

Tennessee Waltz - about a friend that stole a man's sweetheart as they danced to Tennessee Waltz.

**Tam Lin** – a fairy knight that falls in love with a human and spoils the plans of the chief fairy to be a sacrifice to the Gods (by loving a human, he is impure and cannot be the sacrifice – selfish love?)

**Columbus Stockade Blues** – man behind bars and a woman he can't be with. Maybe she doesn't want to be with him. "Go and leave me if you wish to." In your heart, you love some other. Leave me darling, I don't mind."

**Young Jane** – Jane Seymour, one of the wives of Henry the VIII who ended up in the guillotine


## Unusual Musical Instruments - Part 2

Join us for a continuation of last Spring's lecture on the world of unusual and obscure musical instruments. Several obscure instruments are regaining popularity such as the Hammered and Mountain Dulcimers, Ukulele and Hurdy Gurdy. A variety of novelty instruments such as the Therapy Monochord, Tremoloa, Marxolin, Marxophone, and Ukelin, will be presented as well as the Japanese Taishogoto, Hungarian Citera, Scandinavian Psalmodicon and Tahitian Ukulele. Instruments and their history will be discussed as well as brief performances.

David and Theresa Smith are retired support staff from Henry Ford College. They are members of Silver Strings Dulcimer Society, and Great Lakes Ukulele Gathering. David is also a woodworker hobbyist who built his first musical instrument in 1975. Over the past 40 years he has built and collected over 30 instruments.
